Downtown Beloit rocks out during street dance

Starting at 5:30 p.m. blues band The Reverend Raven and the Chain Smoking Alter Boys took to the stage much to the delight of the crowd. Roscoe residents Susan Galvin and her husband Bill Lazor said this was their third time coming to the street dance.
